Decommissioning of Jerarra Dam

Decommissioning

Since May of this year, Kiama council have been in the process of decommissioning Jerrara dam.

The dam has never been able to be used as a water source and was becoming far too expensive for the council to maintain. To keep the dam, more safety measures needed to be installed and the dam wall needed to be raised, so decommissioning was a much cheaper and practical option. Unfortunately, as our RDA centre backs onto the dam, the decommissioning work has affected the operation of our centre's riding classes. With the constant work taking place, and lots of heavy machinery on the property, it has been an unsafe environment to continue to run classes in, and we had to regretfully finish up riding classes for the year at the end of May.

During these past months, several changes have been made to parts of the centre's grounds and paddocks close to the dam. Every time the volunteers came down to feed the horses on their weekly roster, it looked different! Check out the photos below of the changes to the saddle yards.

Although this has been a difficult period regarding the operating of the centre, we are extremely grateful to Kiama council for considering the preservation of our centre in this process by going to the extra trouble and expense to build the concrete wall necessary to protect our centre.

So, Jerrara Dam has now been successfully decommissioned; however, there is still some work to be finished off (such as fences to be fixed and/or replaced, and new saddle yards to be erected) which is scheduled to be completed early in the new year.

Flooding!

The heavy rains we received in the Illawarra area in late August brought a lot of attention to Jerrara dam. In the past, heavy rains have often sent the dam on amber alert and there was quite a lot of concern of its stability on this occasion, as the dam was in the process of being decommissioned.

On the morning of August 25th, Jerrara dam was issued a red alert and the SES issued an urgent evacuation notice for the residents downstream of the dam.

RDA volunteers were strongly advised against attempting to get to the centre so as not to put anybody in any unnecessary danger. Thanks to the assistance of Westpac Life Saver Rescue Helicopters, who helped

with the reconnaissance flight, the SES were able to assess the dam and determine that our horses were in no immediate danger.

After the waters had subsided and the RDA volunteers were able to get to the centre again within the next few days, we were amazed to find that, apart from the ground being a bit soggy, there was no water damage at all!

This bit of excitement in late August created a bit of drama and suspense for all who were concerned about the RDA centre, but we are pleased to be able to inform that no damage was done to the property and all our horses and volunteers stayed safe.

Featured Volunteer

This issue's featured volunteer is: Norm Power

Norm Power has been working as a volunteer at RDA Illawarra since 1991, when his daughter Rita left North Rocks School and came back home to live. Rita had been attending RDA lessons whilst at North Rocks and both Norm and his wife Dawn wished her to keep up with her riding. Norm came along to RDA with Rita as her helper. It wasn't long before Norm became "one of the crew". He was nominated as a Vice President at the following Centre AGM and held that title until March 2007, when he decided that someone else, in Norm's words, "Should be in charge of Vice for a while", and happily took up a position as an "ordinary" committee member. Norm has since been re-elected to "Vice" and is now a life-member of the committee.



Norm has helped at the Centre in many ways. He was always in attendance at working bees, and soon became the resident BBQ expert at all fundraisers, cooking up a storm at every catering event that was held. Norm's bacon and egg rolls were to die for, and the hamburgers he made were huge.



In his time at Illawarra Centre, Norm has worked as a leader and side-walker during lessons, assisting with saddling and all general care to both the horses and equipment. He has attended the training sessions for new volunteers, helping them to settle in and explain how things are carried out, gently pointing out any mistakes he sees someone make. Norm happily attends fundraising days and is always one of the first to arrive and usually one of the last to leave. At committee meetings Norm always puts his point of view forward in his quiet unassuming manner and everyone always listens carefully to him.



Since his retirement in 2007 Norm now attends the Centre 2-3 days per week. He rapidly become an indispensable member of our Grounds and Surrounds crew and can turn his hand to anything. He mows the grass, mends the fences, faithfully attends to the upkeep of the property, feeds the horses, keeps the recreation shed tidy and washes up any dirty dishes and cups he sees lying around. No job is too difficult or too small for him to tackle. Quite often before someone realises that something needs doings Norm has already done it.

In his quiet unassuming way, Norm can always be relied upon to get the job done to the very best of his ability. His wicked sense of humour often makes a dull day bright. He is very gentle with all the riders but can be firm when needed and is well respected by all who know him. His gentle, caring nature makes him a firm favourite with all the riders, volunteers and committee members. Norm is an absolute treasure to have around and we wish we could clone him and have another twenty volunteers just like him.

In May 2015, Norm was one of the four RDA Volunteer recipients of the Outstanding Community Service Award presented by Gareth Ward, local MP for Kiama, for his dedicated service as Vice-President and over 22 years of volunteering at Illawarra Riding for the Disabled.
